Battle of Atlanta: This late afternoon see-saw affair at the Georgia Railroad was a bloody battle within the larger July 22nd Battle of Atlanta. Captain Andrew West of the 41st Georgia described the carnage near the railroad cut when he wrote, "Muskets, canteens, knapsacks; in fact, everything that makes up the accoutrements of the soldier, was here, scattered in every direction." West remembered that, "To the left of the Decatur road was the historic square (Hurt) house, which was filled with thousands of bullets and fragments of shell. At this point the dead lay thickest." To the young Confederate officer, "The wonder seemed not that there were so many dead, but that any lived."
